A variety of new Geiger products help bring a Living Office to life throughout the company's 3rd floor showroom (3-318) at the Merchandise Mart in Chicago, June 9-11.

- Geiger Elsi is a different kind of conferencing system, one that brings a more residential feel to the office. That's important because the office is a place where people spend significant amounts of time, and they want spaces that bring a sense of delight. Geiger Elsi does so by using a distinctive design vocabulary with a warmer, contemporary sensibility that appeals to the demands of high-performing individuals without sacrificing function. Designed by Jess Sorel, of sorelstudio in San Francisco, Geiger Elsi includes a teleconferencing system, small and large conference tables, demountable walls, and a credenza to accommodate technology and media storage.
- Crosshatch Chair uses a minimum of materials in maximally inventive ways, employing handcraft and technology to achieve alluringly refined results. Designed by Eoos, Crosshatch is lightweight and transparent and extremely easy to pull up for a desk-side chat or to relax around a cocktail table. Parachute cords, a common industrial product, are an integral part of the the design. Pulled down, the cords create a system of internal tension and supply the necessary back support, creating the feeling of being enclosed in a comforting, protective nest. Because of its simple, classic profile, a Crosshatch Chair works in a broad range of environments, from the executive office or a reception area, to a Manhattan penthouse or suburban living room.
- Nessel Chair is lightweight yet robust in materials and construction. Designed by noted Belgian architect Vincent Van Duysen, Nessel was created to work in a multitude of spaces: offices, conference rooms, lounges, dining areas, as well as residential settings. Designed with the sitter in mind, it provides maximum comfort. The chair's timeless appeal allows it to blend seamlessly with virtually any furniture period or style—from high-tech to high-baroque. Its solid wood frame is offered in Geiger's exclusive lowsheen or matte wood finishes. The Nessel Side Chair, available with or without arms, is fully upholstered in fabric or leather or in two contrasting fabrics.
- Tuxedo Tables take the award-winning Tuxedo Component Lounge Collection beyond seating, offering designers an almost infinite range of choices. It's now possible to create a harmonious landscape that offers surfaces for working or serving. Individual trays, placed atop the same pencil-thin metal bases as the original system, provide varieties of scale. Designed by BassamFellows, Tuxedo Tables eliminates an excess of legs. The tabletops, crafted of solid wood, have soft-rolled corners and carved edges adding an approachable softness. Smaller trays can be added to nest atop them, for serving or to form a layered table surface. Tuxedo Tables can do duty as a corner unit to separate two lines of seating. Tables come in three sizes, in ash or walnut, with either a solid wood or veneer edge.
- Tuxedo Classic, designed by BassamFellows, offers similar scale to its namesake yet with a more anchored, traditional look. The new group for the Tuxedo Component Lounge extends the line's range, adding a more traditional appearance. Its new and larger upholstered base sits closer to the floor, supported on round, solid wood legs. The overall effect is a more anchored, restrained aesthetic. The beauty of Tuxedo Classic is that it is a component system that does not look like one. While each seat is made as a component, when assembled the units have a tailored look that is anything but modular. Marrying the flexibility and functionality of sectional seating with the elegance of a highly tailored sofa, the group is built on a series of simple base elements from which a full array of configurations are possible. The group includes a lounge chair, settee, and sofa, as well as corner units for all sizes.
